This would help close the gap between home and school connection and reinforce activities, skills and parental involvement at home.

Public Participation

President Taylor noted that during Public Participation, the Board of Education asked for the following:

For our listening audience and as a friendly reminder for our listening audience, notification was sent in regards to "public comment" on June 9, 2022 as follows: During the COVID pandemic, as attendance was limited at Board of Education meetings, Decatur Public Schools modified long-standing procedures to allow public commenters to submit written comments to be read during Board meetings. Now that the majority of COVID restrictions have been lifted, DPS is returning to standard procedure and requests that anyone wishing to address the Board do so in person during the allotted Public Participation portion of Board of Education meetings. Anyone wishing to sign up in advance for public participation may do so by calling Board Secretary Melissa Bradford at 217-362-3011; otherwise, individuals may sign up upon arrival. Masks are still ENCOURAGED for all students, staff, parents, volunteers, visitors, and community members to wear when inside all DPS facilities, including during attendance at Board of Education meetings. This information is also posted on our website.

Please note that during any Board of Education meeting and public participation, Board Members do NOT respond and/or comment to public comments; ALL COMMENTS ARE REFERRED TO ADMINISTRATION. Furthermore, the Board refrains from referring to specific students or staff members by name, and requests that public commenters refrain from doing so as well. The request that you omit names was made to protect you from allegations of libel or slander or from violations of the Illinois School Student Records Act. It was not intended to shield an employee from criticism.

Mary Fromm, Special Education Parent, spoke to the Board regarding her daughter not attending in-person learning due to staffing; RN and/or LPN are required. Ms. Fromm does not have a specialty in Special Education, but she wanted to be her daughter's one-on-one. She does not receive the full in-home nursing due to shortage of staff. The Director of Special Education told her that she could not be the one-on-one due to liability.

Jackson Parrish, High School Teacher at Garfield Learning Academy, spoke to the Board regarding a school bus versus the public transit for the students. The public transit drops them off a few blocks away from the school and he was asking for a school bus specifically for the high school students.

Lori Barrett, Community Member, spoke to the Board regarding ideas for distributing supplies and backpacks. This could be a community event. There were many organizations that would assist. She was happy to assist and help coordinate.

Board Discussion

Mr. Scheider discussed academic remediation. There were students who were not at their grade levels. There could be RtI small groups, tutoring with Reading Specialists only. and more Teaching Assistants. Mr. Scheider made a motion that DPS 61 shall set a goal of placing a teaching assistant in each self-contained elementary classroom. Attorney Braun replied that you cannot make a motion as it was not on the agenda. President Taylor noted that changes to the policies should go through the Policy Committee.

The Board and the Superintendent continued discussions on processes, procedures and policies.

Ms. Banks will bring Mr. Scheider's request to the next Policy Committee Meeting.

Attorney Braun noted that the Open Meetings Act requires that a motion be on the agenda before the Board meeting. However, discussion could take place at any time.

Mr. Scheider asked for a Volunteer Coordinator position. Volunteers can be a resource for helping students. After a few months, the District needs to check on the number of volunteers in the schools and what they were doing.

Mr. Scheider asked about other ways to receive input from District staff, other than electronically.

Mr. Scheider asked about a partnership agreement with Millikin University. If students would commit to working in District 61, we should help them financially.

President Taylor and Mr. Dion asked about school supplies. Superintendent Clark replied that the principals know their budgets for school supplies for their buildings. Administration asked them to meet with their staff regarding the process for requesting supplies. The staff needs to ask their building principal. Dr. Mike Curry, Chief Operational Officer, noted that the principals' budgets include instructional supplies. He spoke directly to the principals on how they should communicate to their staff regarding supplies.

Mary Ann Schloz, Assistant Director of Finance, Grants and Special Projects, noted that water fountains were turned off and the District bought water bottle filling stations. There would be at least one per building.

President Taylor asked for a date to be set in the near future to discuss the next steps regarding Dennis Lab School. Superintendent Clark replied okay.

Dr. Collins-Brown asked about other building issues. Kent Metzger, Director of Buildings and Grounds, replied that he sent a very detailed list regarding the buildings. The secure entry at Garfield has been discussed and the plan was to use the outer door as the secure entry. People will be buzzed into the building and handled accordingly. There were some financial constraints.

Ms Bradford - please read this at the next board meeting.

Dear Board of Education and Administration,

I have been teaching in DPS for over 20 years. I am passionate about my second grade students and truly pushing them to their highest potential. Although each year has its own struggles, I am currently frustrated with not getting any of my sick days back that I was FORCED to use last year due to covid restrictions. I did not have covid nor did I have symptoms. I tested weekly, wore a mask, and guarantined when forced to. The district's guidelines last year caused me to miss out on teaching my students for TEN school days. Most of my coworkers and most(or all) surrounding district teachers had 100% of those days returned to them. I had NONE of those ten days returned to me. Our district's policies forced me to stay home for 10 days last year and use sick days, even though I was perfectly healthy all 10 of those days. It is VERY difficult showing up for work every day right now when one year's worth of sick days were basically taken away from me. I am writing this to you because I would like a response. I want to know why/how this makes any sense? I want you to consider this being the situation of one of YOUR own family members who had their year's worth of sick days taken away from them. I want you to understand that I am a teacher that sacrificed and adjusted to ALL of those crazy changes that we had to go through over the past few years...and I'm still here. I am also a teacher that has lost many coworkers to other districts, but I'm still here. This discrimination that you have chosen is exactly the opposite of what you have been training me to avoid in my classroom. Again, I would like a response right away from you as I have already emailed each of you individually. When will these ten days be returned to me? Why am I forced to lose 10 days of sick time for being healthy? I assume YOU are willing to take a stand against discrimination.

My name is Leara F. Evans, I am a resident of Decatur and former teacher of Decatur Public Schools that retired after working 30 plus years for the Distrivt. My questions are:

- 1. Why did the district have 6 Black Administrators leave the District during the past year and all of them had only been in the positions that they resigned from less than a year? The 6 administrators were Mr. Henry Walker, Director of Transportation, Dr. Judith Campbell, Director of Teaching & Learning, Mr. Jason Hood, Director of Human Resources, Mr. Marquis Stewart Director of Teaching & Learning, Ms. Jeneka Gully, Principal of South Shores and later demoted to Assistant Principal of Eisenhower High School and Ms. Staphanie Morgan Harris, Principal at Muffley Elementary and later demoted to Assistant Principal at Hope. Three of them left with Separation Agreements that were Problematic to me because of the "gag order" language that is very suspicious in nature as well as the amount of financial compensation given for resignation. Why????
- 2. Why didn't the entire board vote to extend the deadline for accepting applications from those wishing to apply for the vacant position on the board that was vacated by Dan Oakes? President Taylor just announced that the deadline be extended without a vote at the August 23, 2022 meeting. It is my understanding that the entire board should have voted to extend the deadline during open session? Why are you not giving all candidates that applied an interview before choosing the replacement? Could it be that the decision was made when the deadline was extended to allow the person you had chosen a chance to apply? If so, this is the corruption that is ruining and plaquing the district, when will it stop???? I know of two candidates that applied that made their intentions know publicly and one of them that applied before the first deadline but did not get an interview, Why? No equity especially for Black candidates, Why??? We need the black community to be represented?
- 3. My last question today is, "Why are retired teachers being taken off the Substitute list in the District?", especially when the District is advertising that they desperately need Substitutes? Also why is it recommended on the Ancillary Salary Schedule tonight to pay Retired Social Workers, Speech Pathologist and Psychologist \$300.00 a day when you only pay a licensed retired teacher that takes a fulltime position for the district for 140 days \$255.00 a day which is the same as a substitute that has never taught the same per day? For you information the Social Workers, Speech Pathologist and Psychologist are under the same DEA contract as teachers before retiring. How is this fair? Also the Human Resource Director is part of the DLT so why \$611.00 a day when the Ancillary Salary Schedule covers DLT members at \$500.00 a day?

Your accountability and transparency ratings are getting worse with every decision you make. When is it going to STOP????? Inquiring minds want to know???????

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS:

A notice of pubic hearing was published on August 24, 2022 in The Herald & Review. The budget has been available for the past 30 days at the District's Business Office and the Decatur Public Library. As of this writing, no public input or comments have been received.

Changes to Expenses – Since the Tentative Budget was approved, the follow expensese were updated for the final budget:

- Updated building budgets in the Education fund to reflect current enrollment numbers
- \$134,635 in Fund 90 expenditures was transferred to Fund 60 Changes to Revenues – Since the Tentative Budget was approved, the following revenues were updated for the final budget:
- \$1,000,000 in potential Sales Tax Revenue was reallocated from Fund 30 to Fund 60
- Fund 90 Revenue was adjusted down by \$367,900

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The revenues and expenses have been updated to reflect the best known information at this time. The direct operational funds (educational, operations and maintenance, transportation, and working cash funds) project expenditures that exceed the direct operation revenues by \$416,214.00

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

This project is being undertaken to replace the existing home-side bleachers, the concession stand/restroom facilities, the field lighting and to improve security and ADA accessibility associated with the football field and the parking lot. In addition to the work covered under this bid, DPS maintenance staff will be responsible for demolishing the existing home-side bleachers and the existing concession stand/restroom building. The bleachers have been a continuing maintenance issue due to age and deterioration. The concession stand and restrooms are antiquated and insufficient.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS:

Two (2) contractors provided bids for the work with each providing a Base Bid and two (2) Alternate Bids. The apparent low bidder was Christy-Foltz of Decatur, IL with a Base Bid of \$5,145,519.00, an Alternate Bid #A-1 of \$35,000.00, and an Alternate Bid #A-2 of \$96,118.00. The other bidder was Grunloh Construction of Effingham, IL with a Base Bid of \$5,726,000.00, an Alternate Bid #A-1 of \$36,000.00, and an Alternate Bid #A-2 of \$98,000.00. As DPS had a project goal of 15% MBE participation and 20% minority workforce participation, both bids were reviewed by Coleman and Associates. Both firm's bids demonstrated MBE utilization below the established goal. In light of that shortcoming, a meeting of the MBE Good Faith Effort (GFE) committee was convened. Coleman and Associates provided a written recommendation that both firms had provided a GFE. Based on Coleman and Associates review and recommendation, the GFE committee reached a consensus that Christy-Foltz had provided a GFE, and was determined to be the lowest responsible bidder. The bid tabulation and the GFE documentation is attached.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The cost of the project has been allocated to Fund 60.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

The Administration respectfully requests the Board of Education accept and approve the Base Bid and Alternate Bid #A-1 from Christy-Foltz for a total of \$5,180,519.00. The Administration does not perceive the Alternate Bids #A-2 to be of sufficient value to DPS to award that Alternate Bid as this work can be accomplished by B&G staff for less expense.

Good Faith Effort Evaluation and Recommendation for Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) Goals

Period of GFE Review: August 31, 2022—September 2, 2022

Date of Final Recommendation: September 9, 2022

Good Faith Effort Recommendation

The recommendation is that the documentation of good faith effort by Christy-Foltz is sufficient to have them determined as a low responsive and responsible bidder. Therefore, based on their bid, including proposed MBE utilization, the award of the construction contract should be made to Christy-Foltz.

Post-Bid Analysis

Grunloh with a total bid of \$5,860,000 achieved 11.34% proposed MBE utilization using two MBEs compared to less than 1% utilization by Christy-Foltz with a total bid of \$5,276,637. Grunloh's total bid price is higher than Christy-Foltz by \$583,363. Christy-Foltz is self-performing site flat concrete work. This is non-foundation building concrete work at a cost of \$232,000, when Grunloh is using Veya, Inc. (MBE) for same scope of work at \$426,770. The **engineer's estimate** obtained from BLDD Architects for site flat concrete work was estimated at \$205,000. The **engineer's estimate** for foundation-related concrete work was an additional \$128,000. The confirmation of the engineer's estimate of both concrete scope of work items was obtained on September 2.

Assuming that Veya, Inc. for the **base bid** provided the **same** (\$426,770) bid number to Christy-Foltz, subtracting the self-performance number and replacing with Veya's number, Christy-Foltz's base bid would have been \$5,340,289 vs. Grunloh's \$5,726,00. If Christy-Foltz used the Veya, Inc. number and included the three other MBE vendors identified in bid documents, their proposed MBE utilization would have risen to 8.41%.

Given that Veya Inc. was known to be bidding and specified the same site flat concrete scope of work, Veya did provide a **similar** number to both bidders. On bid day Christy-Foltz negotiated Veya, Inc, to \$416,770, a \$10,000 reduction compared to number Veya offered to Grunloh.

Finding Post Bid Analysis

Veya, Inc.'s bid number would not have placed Christy-Foltz at a **price disadvantage** compared to Grunloh, if Christy-Foltz **did not** opt to self-perform the site flat concrete work. However, the Christy-Foltz estimate to self-perform site flat concrete work was generally in-line with the civil engineer's estimate of that construction scope.

Section 00 Procurement and Contract Requirements and Section 00 3102 Minority Business Enterprise Utilization, sub-section 1.9 Good Faith Efforts, Item B, sub-item 5 K and 5 L state:

- K. Negotiate in good faith with interested BEP certified vendors. Evidence of such negotiation must include the names, addresses, email addresses, and telephone numbers of BEP certified vendors that were considered; a description of the information provided regarding the plans and specifications for the work selected for subcontracting and evidence as to why additional agreements could not be reached for BEP certified vendors to perform the work. A Bidder using good business judgment may consider a number of factors in negotiating with BEP certified vendors and may take a firm's price and capabilities into consideration. The fact that there may be some additional costs involved in finding and using BEP certified vendors may not be in itself sufficient reason for a Bidder's failure to meet the goal.
- L. The potential savings gained or the desire of a prime contractor to perform the work of a contract with its own organization or forces does not relieve the bidder of the responsibility to utilize BEP certified vendors or make good faith efforts to negotiate price and potential work with BEP certified vendors.

It should be recognized that on bid day, quotes from ALL vendors are sent to prime bidders and the consideration of a number of factors are involved to corroborate correct and similar scope, etc., then prime bidders must tally and submit a bid that a bidder believes is winnable and does not create undue risk, among other factors to themselves or the owner.

Methodology

Christy-Foltz

Consultant called Dallas Finley on Wednesday, August 31, 2022. Dallas clarified the following in their MBE utilization plan that was part of their bid on subject project.

- 1) Vendors listed on the bottom half of their utilization plan are not to be included toward MBE goal credit since other bidders numbers received were lower and would be utilized. In addition, one of the four vendors listed was a women's business enterprise (WBE) and therefore their utilization would not be counted toward the MBE goal.
- 2) One additional MBE vendor not shown on the MBE utilization plan would be utilized for a small amount of \$3,587.00 for toilet hardware and accessories.
- 3) General Fence Co. was shown as an MBE, however they are in the application phase with IL CMS BEP and are not certified, so their proposed utilization will not count toward MBE goal credit. Proposed MBE vendors have to be certified as such on bid day per bidding requirements established by DPS #61.

During phone call, topics discussed were:

- a) review of documentation and explaining any gaps,
- b) confirming MBEs that supplied bids or who indicated were bidding and did not,
- c) reasons for rejection of MBE bids,

- d) how MBE vendors were solicited,
- e) how follow-up was conducted with MBE vendors, and
- f) issues with bidding documents or procedures related to achieving MBE goals.

Issues identified were:

- a) Missing MBE certification documentation for vendors listed which Christy-Foltz stated they would supply. This applied to CSS, Inc.
- b) Missing Letters of Intent to subcontract, which must be signed by Christy-Foltz, Inc. and identified eligible MBE vendors.
- c) Veya, Inc. negotiated with Christy-Foltz on bid day, however negotiations were unsuccessful. The difference between Veya, Inc.'s number and Christy-Foltz self-performance of concrete work was \$184,770.00 (\$416,770 -\$232,000). Christy-Foltz self-reported both numbers per Consultant notes.
- d) General Fence is not certified as an MBE and informed Christy-Foltz they are seeking MBE certification as they were a year ago.
- e) Buddy's Landscaping (MBE) bid was rejected based on price compared to another bidder. Overage was approximately \$10,500.

In conclusion the request for the following documentation:

- 1.) MBE certifications for those MBE vendors that will be direct 1st tier vendors to Christy-Foltz.
- 2.) Signed Letters of Intent to Subcontract directly with Christy-Foltz for MBE vendors that will be direct first tier vendors to Christy-Foltz.

Christy-Foltz provided all the above requested items the afternoon of September 1, 2022.

Grunloh Construction

Grunloh Construction's MBE utilization plan identified two MBE vendors, Veya, Inc. (\$426,770) and Broeren Russo Construction, Inc. (\$151,200). In both cases, no MBE certification or letters of intent to subcontract were provided with the bid package. Grunloh provided both Letters of Intent to Subcontract on 9/1/2022.

- 1.) The difference in bid price was substantial between the two prime bidders.
- 2.) Both prime bidders were challenged by the lack of response from MBE vendors as evidenced by their documentation of efforts to solicit bids.
- 3.) Grunloh accessed the IL CMS BEP database and provided printouts of both proposed MBE vendors IL CMS BEP certification documentation with their bid submittal.

During the August 30, 2022 bid opening and subsequent bid scrub Christy-Foltz, Inc. submitted the lowest bid out of a total of two bids received. The minority business enterprise (MBE) goal established by Decatur Public School Board policy 4-61 is fifteen (15%). Neither bidder met the MBE goal.

A good faith effort (GFE) review of the MBE outreach, negotiation, and bids received found that both bidders had followed the bidding guidelines for MBE good faith efforts and received bids from MBE vendors. Christy-Foltz, Inc. proposed to utilize three MBE vendors and their utilization totals to .59%.

All material aspects of Christy-Foltz's MBE utilization efforts were met and equal to the next lowest responsible and responsive bidder, Grunloh, Inc. Given these facts and the review of the good faith effort committee, Christy-Foltz is determined as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder and is eligible to move forward in the bid and award process.
